## Staplehurst make it a Striking Competition double - again

Following the success of the joint Call Change and Method Striking Competition in November when nine bands entered, hopes were high for a similar - or even bigger - entry for the 2015 Striking Competition following the same format and held at Ightham on 14th March.

Alas it proved to be a false dawn as just two towers entered a band in each of the Call Change and Method sections. With one of those towers being Staplehurst, there was little challenge to their recent supremacy and they again ran out winners in both sections. This is the third successive year that Staplehurst have won both shields and this is thought to be the first time that a tower has achieved this - in the Maidstone District at least.

Runners-up in both sections were a combined Ightham/Wrotham band, who also won the trophy for the band having the most ringers not having rung in a striking competition before. Full details of the results were as follows:

On the right are some of the early arrivals making sure that they are first in the tea queue. We are extremely grateful to Richard Abnett and the Ightham ringers for hosting the event and for providing some delicious refreshments.

Because of the small entry our original judges, David and Pam Manger, were stood down as we didn't think it was fair to ask them to do a 50 mile round trip to judge just four pieces of ringing, but we thank them for agreeing to do so in the first place. As it was District Secretary Terry Barnard again judged the Competition and we are very grateful to him for doing so.


## 100th Peal at Staplehurst

The 100th peal was rung on Staplehurst bells on Saturday 18th April. This is a landmark for any tower but, to make it even more of an achievement, it was rung by the local band. ## Forthcoming Events

Well, spring is here (according to the calendar at least, if not the weather), the clocks have gone forward and hopefully we can look forward to some nice warm days in the coming months. An ideal opportunity perhaps to get out to some of the District events coming up between now and July. Remember that all our ringing events cater for all levels of ringing from Rounds and Call Changes upwards. Most also include two designated methods, one fairly basic and the other slightly more advanced, to give the keen ringer something to aspire to. However, ringing is tailored to suit those present and, provided you can handle a bell reasonably competently, you will be most welcome.

The next event is a District Practice, on the 15 cwt eight at Linton. The date is Saturday 13th June and the time as usual will be from 10am to 12 noon. The designated special methods are Cambridge Surprise Major and Single Oxford Bob Triples. The blue lines for these are on the back page of this issue and on the District website. Again there will be ample opportunity for Rounds and Call Changes and everyone is most welcome.

Just two weeks later we have the ever popular District Barbeque, on Saturday 27th June. This is currently in the planning stage so no further details are available as we go to press.

More information about this event will be available on the District website when known. Meanwhile please put the date in your diaries now and keep your fingers crossed for good weather!

This brings us to the Summer District Quarterly Meeting at West Malling on Saturday 11th July. Please note that, unlike previous years when this meeting has been held on a (normally warm) summer's afternoon, this year it will be a morning event and ringing on the $101 / 4 \mathrm{cwt}$ eight will be from 10am to 12 noon with a break of about 30 minutes for the short business meeting. The designated special methods have still to be decided but will appear on the District website when known. Again, all are welcome, whatever your level of ringing and there will of course be plenty of rounds, call changes and Plain Hunt

It is planned to have a District Outing some time in August but the precise date and format this will take have yet to be decided. Further details will be in the July issue of The Belfry and, as ever, will also be posted on the District website.

Finally, it is proposed to hold the District 10-bell practice at Maidstone, which was cancelled due to a clash with the national VE anniversary ringing event, on a future date as yet to be decided. Due publicity will be given when details are known.

This being our 100th issue we thought that our readers might be interested to see what appeared in the very first issue of the current series of The Belfry and, for comparison, what was happening at the time of our Silver Jubilee, Golden Jubilee and 75th issues.

OUR VERY FIRST ISSUE appeared in January 1982 and was simply a double-sided single sheet, typed on an antique mechanical machine called a typewriter, and photocopied. The editor was Roy Barclay and production was in the hands of the then District Secretary John Caley.

Nevertheless a considerable amount of news was packed into those humble two sides. The Editorial in that issue for example set out the aims and objectives of the "Maidstone District Newsletter" and sought contributions for future issues; it also included a news round-up, details of future events - and asked for suggestions for a name!

A report of the 1981 ADM showed that proceedings took more than two hours and involved almost a complete change of District Officers. The names are quite interesting: Tom Riley (Chairman) and John Caley (Secretary) no longer ring; Nigel Baker, then one of the joint Ringing Masters, is still Tower Captain at Hollingbourne, whilst the other Ringing Master, Phil Barnes still rings at Wrotham and is also County Peal Secretary. Martin Pring, then District Rep, still rings at All Saints Maidstone and Chris Saunders, the other District Rep, has recently returned to the Committee in the same capacity. Only your Editor, Roy Barclay, has remained on the Committee for the whole 33 years.

ISSUE No 25 in March 1989 was quite a small edition surprisingly perhaps since it was the first one for 8 months. The Editorial looked forward optimistically to the 50th issue "sometime in the mid-nineties". (Well, it wasn't far out!). It exhorted ringers to submit more contributions; people clearly took note as these days several people contribute quite regularly - and we are grateful.

Belfry Gossip congratulated three relatively unknown ringers on their first peals; their names were Michael Birkbeck, Darren Elphick and Mark Gilham! All three are now, of course, accomplished ringers, although Mark doesn't ring very much these days. Congratulations of a different kind were offered to the Editor of The Belfry Roy Barclay and his wife Sallyann on the birth of their first child, Richard, who is of course now a far more accomplished ringer than his dad. Maurice Fermor of East Sutton and his wife Irene had celebrated their Golden Wedding and Maurice his 80th birthday

We were sorry to have to report in Issue 25 the death of Eric Boorman, father of Nigel (then of Wateringbury and now in Sussex). Although not a ringer himself, Eric had been a staunch supporter of ringing and ringers.

ISSUE No 50 in May 1996 rejoiced in the fact that, despite many ups and downs, The Belfry had reached its Golden Jubilee issue. To mark this achievement there was a guest editorial by Revd Brian Barnes, then Rector of

Staplehurst, who took the theme of noise pollution in society. The conclusion that "most Church bells have been in position a long time and if society decides to allow development that might be disturbed by the visible, audible church that has to be dealt with" is probably more relevant now than ever!

The third in an occasional series entitled The Personal Touch featured Mal Williams of Otham. Asked what was his greatest ambition in ringing Mal replied that it would be to see Otham's bells augmented - a dream that eventually came true in 2012. By a sad coincidence Issue 50 also carried an obituary to Eileen Bond, tower secretary at Otham.

Another series appeared for the first time, featuring towers around the District. All Saints Maidstone was the subject and the article included some very interesting historical facts.

There was a report on a "Ones Week" which truly lived up to its name with just one "first" being rung. Meanwhile the County AGM, hosted by Lewisham District reached its lowest ebb with an overpriced lunch and no bar. Rather more successful was the District Darts Tournament which attracted no less than 11 entries, the winners being Birling for the second successive year. Alas this event has long since ceased due to lack of support.

Not all was doom and gloom in 1996 however. Yalding looked forward to a festival weekend to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the casting of their original four bells.

ISSUE 75 appeared in April 2003, by which time it was also available on-line and was thus available to most individual ringers at the click of a mouse. One of the main themes in this issue was training matters. A thoughtprovoking editorial looked at the learning curve in ringing and, in a separate article, Sue Bassett looked at the new District Training video Look To and Learn and discussed training teachers and teaching learners.

A "Top Tower" competition was launched, assessing a variety of areas that encourage good ringing opportunities including: administration within the tower, local publicity, bell maintenance, safety issues, recruitment, training and welcome of visitors. Again there was little support for this initiative and it was subsequently dropped. On a brighter note, the 120 Club celebrated its 5th birthday and is still continuing to go from strength to strength.

In 2003 Child Protection was beginning to become an important issue and Issue 75 carried an article about Guidelines on Child Protection in the Context of Bellringing. Nowadays this is of course an important facet in almost every aspect of life.

On a personal note the passing was reported of Pamela Hounsom, tower Secretary at Harrietsham, whilst Tom Cullingworth celebrated his 90th birthday. Achievements in April 2003 included Roland (Fred) King's first quarter of

Minor, ringing the 5th to Plain Bob at Yalding, whilst Richard Barclay took his first tentative steps in Surprise Royal.
Amongst upcoming events was the County AGM which, as this year, was hosted by our District. The venue was to be Staplehurst and a look at the ringing programme shows a remarkable similarity to this year's event at Marden. Well there's no point in re-inventing the wheel...! For a few years during the early part of this century the Striking Competition was held on a knockout basis and we looked forward to the finals between the surviving four teams in June. Alas after a promising start support for this idea waned and we reverted to the one-off contest - which still lacks support. Following the success of the previous year's District Outing, a more ambitious one was proposed for 2003 visiting Norwich with the option of an overnight stay. There is no record of whether this ever happened.

And so on to this, our centenary issue. We hope you have enjoyed the previous 99 and will continue to enjoy The Belfry for many years to come. True or what....!


## I'm confused.....

Then let our
Jargon Buster
Help you!

Can you imagine ringing in handcuffs? It is done, and not necessarily by the National Guild of Police Ringers. While you ponder that one, let's have a look at some other common, and not so common, bellringing terms in the latest of our jargon buster series.

Belfry: (Strictly) bell chamber, but sometimes incorrectly used to refer to the ringing chamber. Also the title of the Maidstone District's Quarterly Newsletter.

Blue line: A diagram showing the path of a bell through a method. It can be formed by joining successive positions of one bell when the rows are written under one another. Some publications use a different convention and draw the blue line rotated through $90^{\circ}$, i.e. running from left to right, rather than top to bottom. With this convention, up and down on the page correspond to up and down in the row.

Pivot position: The lead end about which point the work is symmetrical, a point of symmetry in the blue line.
Bob course: A touch containing all bobs and no plain leads.
Cartwheel: Closed lead ringing.
College Youths: The Ancient Society of College Youths. One of two very old ringing organisations (see next entry for the other one) not tied to any specific area or group of ringers. Prior to 1998 membership was restricted to males only.

Cumberlands: The Society of Royal Cumberland Youths. The other of two very old non-territorial ringing organisations mentioned above. Unlike the College Youths, membership has never been restricted by sex.

CRU: Abbreviation for Combination roll up. (Usually in Major) a row ending with any two of 4,5,6 followed by 78 (e.g. 4678).

Exercise, The: Collective word for the ringing fraternity. Originated in the 17th century when young gentry rang bells for exercise.

Extent: The maximum number of different rows on any number of bells, and hence the maximum number of changes that can be made without repeating any rows. Mathematically, this number is calculated as the factorial of the number of bells. The factorial of 4 is $1 \times 2 \times 3 \times 4=24$, of 5 is $1 \times 2 \times 3 \times 4 \times 5=120$, etc.

Firing: Bells are fired by ringing them almost simultaneously in ascending sequence, i.e. (rounds backwards). In some places this is traditional after a wedding or other celebration and was recently done at the service at Westminster Abbey commemorating the 70th anniversary of VE Day.

Fish tail: Work resembling a fish's tail, i.e. two points preceded and followed by hunting in opposite directions.

What then are Handcuffs? In fact they are a teaching aid sometimes used to help correct bad handling involving excessive sideways movement of the arms. A loop of rope is twisted into figure of eight, and a hand passed through each loop. This makes it impossible to move the hands far apart. Sounds rather cruel to me, and a little dangerous should anything go wrong!

## County AGM 2015

County AGMs come and go, but this year's was something special (apart of course from the fact that our District organised it!). Firstly the highlight of the day was the election of Tom Barlow as a Vice-president of the KCACR - an honour only bestowed in recognition of outstanding service to the Association. In introducing the motion District Secretary Terry Barnard said "We in the Maidstone District are concerned that very few of the Association Vice Presidents are ringers or those who had served the exercise of change ringing. With this in mind we would like to propose a new Vice President. This person has served the Association loyally over many, many years, serving as Tower Captain, District Chairman, and for 3 years as the County Chairman. They have rung 2,414 peals - 2,007 of which have been for the Kent County Association. They have rung peals with 1,048 different ringers, some of whom are here today. They continue to provide help to those less able and to inspire those with whom they ring. And I call on the youngest and newest member of Maidstone District - Miss Ashleigh Horton - to read the citation." Whereupon in a very moving moment young Ashleigh said "Ladies and Gentlemen, we propose Mr Thomas Barlow of St Michael and All Angels, Maidstone, to be Vice President". Retiring Chairman Mike Little then presented Tom with his certificate to a standing ovation.

And it didn't end there. The new County Chairman is our own Daniel Brady who was elected by a majority vote. At 26 years of age Daniel is probably the youngest ever to chair the Association and, with some progressive ideas, we can look forward to some interesting times during his triennium.

The only other changes of officership are Treasurer, where Margaret Funnell pops back out of retirement to take on the thankless task of Treasurer, and Handbook Editor, where Tim Munt steps into Graham Coker's shoes. The vacant position on the "extra three" is filled by Caroline Stockmann.

As usual towers were open on various routes to and from Marden. Open ringing commenced at Marden at 11.00 am, culminating in a wonderful sounding service touch of Stedman Triples by an invited band organised by District Ringing Master Richard Barclay. The service itself was taken by Canon David Grimwood, with the intercessions read by Daniel and Debbie Brady, the readings by Roy Barclay and Doug Davies and the names of those ringers who had passed away since the last AGM remembered by Revd Stanley Evans.

Following the service, everyone moved on to the Memorial Hall and enjoyed a lovely three-course meal organised by the West End Tavern nearly next door. The meeting began at around 2.45 pm , with 108 members in attendance. Amongst the business transacted was the adoption of the amended Association rules (albeit with a couple of minor adjustments to satisfy the odd objection), the presentation of certificates to eight members marking their 50 years' membership of the Association - alas none from our District - and of course the election of Tom Barlow as a Vice-President.
