## Patricia Dickens

In the last issue of The Belfry we reported briefly that Pat Dickens of Barming had passed away on 12th July 2005. With the agreement of Pat's family we now give below an appreciation of her life to mark the first anniversary of her passing.

The sudden death of Pat, after a short illness, came as a great shock to her family, friends and everyone who knew her in the ringing world.

Pat had been a member of the County Association for over 50 years having been expertly taught to ring at Egerton by the late Alex Waddington. For the majority of her ringing life she had rung at St Margaret's Barming. She was a member of 'COOTS', and had been one of the organisers of their annual ringing holidays for the past three years.

Besides ringing, Pat was devoted to her family, especially John her husband to whom she had been married for 40 years, her three sons and her grandchildren. She was an active member of St Andrew's Barming Heath, the parish next door to St Margaret's, working with children, the MU and CMS. In her 'spare time' Pat did voluntary work both as a visitor and as a driver ferrying patients to and from hospital.

Prior to her funeral in a packed St Andrew's Church, the bells of St Margaret's were rung half-muffled by members of St Margaret's and 'COOTS'.

## Distribution of The Belfry

Some ringers in the Maidstone District still seem to be unaware that The Belfry is now available in electronic format and, even if they do, they don't know how to go about getting a copy. Hopefully the information below will help clarify matters.

## Q. How do I know whether I am on the electronic circulation list?

A. If the covering e-mail starts with the words 'To everyone on "The Belfry" e-circulation list' then you are on the e-list.
Q. I am already on the "KCACR Maidstone Group". Is this the same thing?
A. No. The KCACR Maidstone Group is a means of members contacting each other. The ecirculation list is solely for the Editor/Webmaster to send information to members.

Q How do I join the e-circulation list?
A Simply send an e-mail to thebelfry@kcacr-maidstone-district.org.uk with the word "subscribe". You can come off the list at any time by sending an e-mail saying "unsubscribe". It's as simple as that!
Q. Won't I be laying myself open to "spam" (junk e-mail) by joining the list?
A. No. The Belfry is sent under cover of a "blind" e-mail. That is, the e-mail address appears as "Undisclosed recipients", so your identity is preserved. Furthermore, the Data Protection Acts prohibit us from passing details on to third parties.
Q. How about viruses?
A. All outgoing e-mails and attachments from the webmaster/editor's computer is checked by Norton Internet Security, one of the world's leading anti-virus programmes. However, as always recipients should also virus check their incoming messages and attachments.
Q. But what are the advantages of receiving The Belfry in electronic format?
A. There are several. First and foremost you will receive the electronic version about two weeks before the hard copy is issued. You will also receive it direct, rather than have to wait for your tower secretary to pass it round to everyone in the tower in turn. You can either read it on your computer screen or print all or any part of it off. Even the most basic printer should give a much better quality finish than the hard copy...in particular the pictures which will appear in colour (assuming of course that you have a colour printer!). Finally, there will be a considerable financial saving to the KCACR in terms of paper and copying costs - money that could be put to far better use.
Q. Why not post The Belfry on the District website?
A. The electronic version of The Belfry is also posted on the website, so you can get your copy by going to www.kcacr-maidstone-district.org.uk/electronic belfry.htm instead. However, you will have to keep checking to see if it has been published, whereas if you are on the e-list it will be e-mailed to you the minute it is published.
Q. What if I haven't got a computer (or I am not connected to the internet)?
A. Don't worry. A paper version of The Belfry will continue to be available to those who want it.
Q. Does anyone at my tower already receive the electronic version?
A. The following towers already have a designated person receiving the electronic version: Aylesford, Barming, Bearsted, Birling, Boughton Monchelsea, Boxley, East Farleigh, East Malling, Harrietsham, Hollingbourne, Hunton, Ightham, All Saints Maidstone, Nettlestead, Otham, Snodland, Stansted, Staplehurst, Ulcombe, Wateringbury, West Malling, Wrotham and Yalding.
It is hoped that these "primary" recipients will print off a copy for their tower.
Q. Finally, if I join the e-circulation list, will I receive other information from the KCACR?
A. The only other information you will receive is tower updates or "all member" documents, although you can opt out of receiving these if you wish.

So you see, the whole idea is to make individual members more aware of what is going on, and at the same time saving the Association money. Please consider joining the e-circulation list. If you need any further information please contact the Editor at thebelfry@kcacr-maidstone-district.org.uk.

## Now we are Six

We had five bells in St. Mary The Virgin at Nettlestead, which had the reputation of being a difficult ring. Then, in 2002, the tower captain and his wife, David and Marguerite Allen, suggested that we should consider having the bells lowered and tuned with the possibility of adding a new treble.

The wheels were in terrible condition and ran out of true by as much as six inches and as a result tended to throw the ropes off unless the rope was kept tight the whole time, quite a challenge for experienced ringers never mind our learners. The bells were out of tune, quite badly odd-struck and hung on tired old plain bearings. Alan Hughes of Whitechapel Foundry was asked to visit us and give us his opinion and advice and of course an estimate of costs involved.

In the meantime Marguerite's Mother died and David and Marguerite decided to donate the new treble to the memory of Marguerite's parents. The fund raising went on apace and a number of grants were found to add to the fund and finally The Heritage Lottery Fund gave us a very good sum to make up to the $£ 33,000$ that was required. A date was set for Monday $8^{\text {h }}$ August when the bells should be delivered to Whitechapel and everything became geared up to that date.

We rang our last quarter peal on the five bells on $25^{\text {th }}$ July with the help of our neighbouring towers, Wateringbury and Yalding, Marguerite rang the treble for her first Quarter peal. Our final service ring was on Sunday $31^{\text {st }}$ July. On the Monday morning three of us went up the tower and started to dismantle the wheels and all the fittings and bring them down into the Church.

There is no lowering hatch in the tower at Nettlestead as the organ is immediately below the ringing chamber so the bells have to be lowered through the stairway hatch into the ringing chamber and from there dragged across to a window into the church, on to a scaffold, and then lowered on to the church floor.

Early on the following Saturday morning Brian Butcher, the county Bell Restoration Officer, arrived with his band of assistants and, with the labouring provided by our band, the work commenced. By four o'clock the bells had been lowered to the church floor, put onto pallets and taken up to the road where they were loaded on to a trailer ready for their trip to

Whitechapel.
Whilst the bells were away the tower was cleaned ready for their return. We were very lucky during this time that Hunton and Wateringbury allowed us to practice in their towers. On $4^{\text {th }}$ October we collected the retuned bells, together with the new treble, from Whitechapel and moved them into the church on $7^{\text {th }}$.

We are very fortunate at Nettlestead that the Anglicans and the Roman Catholics share the Church. On Sunday $9^{\text {th }}$ October in the presence of a joint congregation. the dedication of the new treble and the blessing of the other five was conducted by the Anglican Bishop Richard Gear and the Catholic Bishop John Hines.

It had been decided that the old frame was in good condition and we would be able to rehang the bells in it with their new roller bearings and new metal headstocks. There were only five pits and this left one bell with no home to hang in. Whitechapel made a steel frame which fitted over the stairway hatch, leaving us just enough room to squeeze through, in which the number three now hangs. The following Monday the bellhangers from Whitechapel, Peter and Neil, arrived and started to raise the bells back up the tower with ,of course, our help again as labourers. By the end of the week all was back in place and ready for a test ring. This was a really exciting moment as no one knew how they would sound. They were a great success they were so tuneful and were so much easier to handle - worth all the effort, and the new treble was lovely.

We rang our first quarter peal on the bells on Thursday $10^{\text {th }}$ November with the same band as before plus Peter Mack on the tenor, his first quarter. Everyone who has been involved with the operation is well pleased with the end result and we have a ring to be proud of now we are six.

## Coots over the water

On a sunny October day, a party of 17 ringers plus friends and relatives, travelled from all parts of Kent to the Isle of Wight with the aim to ring, over a five day break, at all towers with peals of bells.

Arriving on the Island we met at Ryde's large Victorian church whose tower dominates the skyline as you approach by ferry from Portsmouth. Despite having the heaviest tenor of all the towers on the Island, the holiday got off to good start and we managed to ring Grandsire Triples and Bob Major. Full of confidence we then went on to Brading where our aim of ringing at all towers was dashed. Builders were working at the church, and Health \& Safety notices were everywhere banning entry to the tower which we gather was unsafe. Slightly deflated we continued our trip to Daishes Hotel in Shanklin, our comfortable base for the holiday.

Day two was our busiest day with five towers. Despite all Freda Groves' careful route planning and timings, we were immediately faced with the major problem of the main road between Shanklin and Godshill being shut. The diversion added over ten miles to what should have been a relatively short journey. Despite this early setback, the morning went well, despite the closeness of ropes at both Whitwell and Chale being a little off putting to some ringers. A pleasant surprise awaited Daphne Pollard, the sister of the late Pat Dickens, when at Chale we were met by Paul Mills her next door neighbour when she and Pat lived in Egerton with their mother. Niton with its bells on plain bearings was amongst the best rings we encountered. We then rallied through single width lanes to avoid the diversions and road closures around Godshill, where, after lunch at a local Hostelry, we trudged through rather inclement weather to ring at the church whose position dominates the whole village. The final tower in Shanklin was the only one we encountered on the island which could be classed as disappointing with its challenging heavy going bells. Despite the difficulties at the final tower, overall we had a good day's ringing with the highlight being the

## course of Cambridge at Godshill.

Day three was to the West of the island, where it was planned to ring at Brighstone and Freshwater in the morning leaving the afternoon free to explore the island. The ringing at Brighstone was at times the best we achieved on the holiday. Onto Freshwater, where once again Health \& Safety issues prevented us ringing. The belfry ceiling had collapsed earlier in the year, and until the cause of this problem could be identified no ringing was being allowed. Twenty five of us did, however, celebrate Communion taken by the local incumbent who had met his wife when they were both ringers. John Dickens played the organ and David Earl assisted with the Communion.

The three towers on day four, unlike the miserable weather, were good. Shorwell, where as with so many other towers today suffers from lack of local ringers, the highlight was a course of Kent. Arreton where a craft village has been established next to the church, we once again managed to ring Cambridge, while at Newchurch the highlight was ringing All Saints at All Saints church.

The final day was warm and sunny, and we were faced with the twelve bells of Newport and ten at Carisbrooke with a depleted band of ringers. Some of our more experienced ringers had unfortunately had to leave early for home. Despite this, we managed to ring good rounds and call changes at Newport where a local dispute over the noise of the bells meant that we asked to limit the length of our visit. We had no such restrictions at Carisbrooke, and once again managed good rounds and call changes, finishing with Bob Minor on the back six. Everyone then departed for the ferry to Portsmouth and then onto their homes.

Overall it was a good break, with all the ringers appreciating the hard work in organising the towers, route planning and accommodation by Freda Groves and the late Pat Dickens. A special thanks must go to John Dickens for agreeing to complete Pat's work on the finances.

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## Aylesford Bell Restoration Project completed

After more than a year of planning, the restoration of our ring is now largely complete. The front five bells, including the two oldest, cast in 1652, had their canons removed and were fitted with new headstocks, bearings, and clappers at Whites of Appleton's works in Oxfordshire. White's also built new wheels for the treble and 2 nd and refurbished and adapted the other wheels to suit.

Brian Butcher ("Red Leader") and five intrepid members of the KCACR's bell restoration team arrived on Saturday 10th December 2005. With help from our steeple keeper Paul Bastow, they got their lifting gear in place and, in quick time, created a suspension point in the roof of the tower, lifted out a section of frame to clear the hatch and set about lowering the front five bells. Quite a large crowd on onlookers had gathered in the church to see the historic event following a short opening service conducted by the Vicar, Simon Tillotson, with a lesson read by the Mayor of Tonbridge and Malling and prayers by representatives of the Aylesford ringers. We lost count of the visitors but think their must have been at least 150. A team of stewards, led by Alison Harman and Tina Bastow, made sure the public, the press, and the VIPs were out of harm's way and kept well informed, while a catering team, led by Brenda Sladen, churchwarden and ringer, provided a continuous supply of hot drinks and sandwiches for the workers and the public.

The church was kept open and manned for the following Sunday and Monday for visitors to see the bells and we were pleased that 62 people plus pupils from some local schools called by.

On Tuesday 13th December the bells were loaded with assistance provided by Ringway Highway Services to a lorry loaned with a driver by Dean and Dyball. We were delighted that the Mayor made time in his busy schedule to come and support us once again.

Whilst the bells were out the electrical system in the tower was renewed and work started to refurbish the ringing chamber.

The bells were returned to the church on February 22nd and hoisted back into the tower on February 25th ready for rededication and ringing to resume on March 12th once again with the invaluable help of the KCACR team.

The ringing chamber has also been refurbished (including provision of a display cupboard to store the hand bells) and the restoration of the chiming apparatus is now almost complete.

All this work has only been possible with the cooperation of the PCC, with obtaining the necessary faculties, and, of course, with fund raising. Total project costs are budgeted at $£ 34,300$ including $£ 6,000$ in voluntary labour and services, $£ 3,200$ for contingency and $£ 3,500$ for VAT. More than $£ 10,000$ has been raised or promised locally; the remaining amount (up to $£ 17,500$ ) has been promised by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Whilst the project is set fair to be completed to budget and on time there have been some hairyscary moments! Balancing on ladders and on the bell frame while waving long poles to persuade the resident pigeons that they would prefer the fresh air outside the tower was one. Discovering that each of the three hatches was obstructed was another delightful moment. But the most bizarre was that Dean and Dyball's lorry was stolen shortly before the bells were due to be transported to Appleton AND exactly the same thing happened just before the bells were due to be brought back.

A lot of effort has been required to get this far. New friendships have been made, a lot of new contacts with the community have been established, both for the church and for the ringers, and a lot of goodwill and publicity generated. But the proof of the pudding has been the restoration of the full ring, and the resumption of ringing at Aylesford which by common consent is now much easier. Grateful thanks are due to all who have helped and supported the project in so many ways.

The 2006 District Striking Contest was held at Yalding on Saturday $10^{\text {th }}$ June. Five bands met on a lovely warm sunny day to do battle - a fairly impressive entry for these days.

It was a very close contest this year, with only three faults separating the first three bands. ## District Events

## January Quarterly Meeting

At one stage no less than 33 ringers were crowded into the ringing room - more than twice the number that attended the ADM and the highest attendance at a District Meeting for some years. Consequently, we were able to ring both the special methods (Grandsire and Superlative) as well as a variety of other methods including Stedman and Cambridge. There was also plenty of opportunity for those who wished to ring rounds and call changes. Our thanks go to Diane Copas and the Marden ringers for the use of the bells and for a delicious tea in a nice warm hall!

## Tower Captains' Meeting

The annual Tower Captains' Meeting took place at Marden on 14th January prior to the Quarterly meeting. Amongst items discussed were the recruitment and retention of ringers; encouraging support for and attendance at District events; training needs; and maintenance. Representatives shared examples of good practice and exchanged ideas, and also reported on the situations at their own towers. Views were also canvassed on the suggestion to re-organise the KCACR Districts. Copies of the minutes of the Tower Captains' and Quarterly Meetings will be available to members of the KCACR in due course, upon application to the District Secretary.

## Surprise Major Practice

Enough people attended the morning Surprise practice at Staplehurst on 11th February to enable a fair variety of ringing, although the Cambridge Royal, in particular, would have benefited from a few more experienced ringers.

## District Visit to Piltdown Campanile

This was a District meeting with a difference. Ringing on a 22lb mini-ring of twelve requires a totally different technique to tower bells - not least that it is best to ring with bent arms! Around twenty people availed themselves of Phil and Liz Barnes' hospitality, ringing from rounds on twelve up to Grandsire Caters on their Piltdown Campanile. It's just a shame that only seven of them were from Maidstone District.

## April Quarterly Meeting

Twenty-five ringers turned up to the Spring Quarterly at East Sutton, including three visitors from Tunbridge Wells; it was also good to welcome Monty Gilbert - one of the District's former stalwarts, now ringing in Canterbury District. There was a wide variety of ringing from Call Changes upwards, including both the special methods, Plain Bob Minor and London. But perhaps what made this meeting just that extra bit special was that, instead of providing the traditional ringers' tea, the East Sutton ringers put on a wonderful lunch of Shepherds Pie followed by Apple Pie and cream or Blackberry Pie and cream. ## Belfry Reminiscences

5years ago in October 2001 the world was still reeling from the horrific events of " $9 / 11$ ", and the Editorial to issue 69 focussed on how the ringing of church bells marked both the celebrations and tragedies of life. Among the features were reports on the Yalding ringers' weekend in Northants and Aylesford's visit to Hertfordshire, whilst Belfry Gossip reported that Boughton Monchelsea and Linton bells had featured on consecutive weeks on the short-lived bell spot on Radio Kent's Good Morning Sunday. The District also bade farewell to Revd Canon Brian Barnes, then Rector of Staplehurst and previously curate at All Saints Maidstone, who was moving to become Vicar of Hythe.

The layout of The Belfry had recently been revamped and the Editor asked, not for the first time, for more input from readers. Not for the first time little was forthcoming. Issue 69 was the first to appear on the District Website although it had teething problems-not least that in those days before broadband was widely available it took an age to download.

10years ago in September 1996 ringing was making national news as a result of an elderly lady in Wiltshire breaking down the 15th Century door of her local church before hacking the bell-ropes to pieces. The Editorial in Issue 51 of September 1996 suggested that we as ringers should do our best to live in harmony with our neighbours and as far as possible pre-empt complaints. On a happier note a band of past and present Yalding ringers rang a peal to celebrate the 300th anniversary of four of Yalding's bells To tie in with these celebrations Yalding was the featured tower in Issue 51. There was also a rare peal at Mereworth. Meanwhile the series of interviews with District ringers featured 14-yearold David Bassett of Staplehurst.

The other major event in the autumn of 1996 was the announcement that as part of their restoration project Staplehurst bells were to be augmented to ten. Issue 51 carried a report on the removal of the bells.

15 years ago in August 1991 the Editorial to issue 31 looked at the high level of publicity that ringing was getting that summer. This provided a good opportunity for recruitment; this would of course mean extra effort in training. Amongst the one-off items was an article by Dot Hooker on Rites of Passage and a report of Nigel Baker's 11th annual ringing tour, to Suffolk, which contained many references to a mysterious "Master Conductor" whose speciality was (miscalling) Grandsire Triples.

Amongst the achievements were Jim Eagle's first quarter-peal as conductor (Plain Bob Doubles at Foots Cray) and Mark Gilham' first peal of Maximus (Cambridge at Bow). Meanwhile a band comprising 5 pupils and one teacher from King's School Rochester rang a peal at East Farleigh. The peal was conducted by the teacher, Barry Roberts - a long-time friend of the Maidstone District. The attendance at the summer quarterly meeting at Hunton was so low that there were not enough to ring until shortly before the service. By 4 pm there were only two ringers! Numbers had swollen to nine for evening ringing on the ten bells at Leeds - surprisingly that enabled 6 -spliced surprise major to be rung!

20years ago in October 1986 Issue No 8 of The Belfry was somewhat smaller than usual. Nevertheless its eight pages contained some interesting items. There were some happy events to report, including the birth of Sue and Chris Bassett's second son Stephen (now a ringer himself), and the marriage of The Belfry's Editor Roy Barclay and Sallyann Farmer of Headcorn. On the debit side the District said farewell to Nigel and Jacky Boorman, long standing stalwarts who were moving to West Sussex. The 1986 Striking Contest had been won for the first time by Staplehurst from what was then considered a "poor" entry of six bands. Meanwhile 63 ringers took part in Quarter-peal Week with 20 of the 26 attempts being successful including an encouraging 44 firsts of one kind or another. Eighteen new members were elected to the Association during 1986. Twenty years later few of them are still active in the District.

But perhaps it is the Editorial, though, that makes the most interesting reading: "..the District is approaching an all-time low...attendance at District Meetings has been abysmal and even some of our more popular practice nights are attracting less and less people..." Well, by present day standards that was Utopia! At least we had proper District Meetings then, and today's general apathy towards any organised event makes those days look exciting!

## Future Events

Summer is, alas, now drawing rapidly to a close, but don't be downhearted. With the cooler days and darker evenings there is more reason than ever to get out and go ringing. Better still, why not try to get to some of the District events lined up for the rest of the year. Details of these are below.

A full list of the remaining District events for 2006 is on the District Calendar on the inside back cover. Could Tower Captains/Secretaries please detach it and place prominently on their tower notice-boards. Remember that you can also check out future events by visiting the District website Maidstone District OnLine at www.kcacr-maidstone-district.org.uk and choosing "Calendar of Events".

Firstly, in October we have the Annual District Meeting which this year returns to All Saints Maidstone on Saturday 14th October. Timings are as follows: Ringing from 3pm, Service (now the only one of the year!) at 4.30 pm , followed by tea in the church at approximately 5.15 pm . The Call Change Striking Contest this year will be held this year at Boxley on Saturday 11th November. The draw for order of ringing will be at 2.30 pm in the church. This is a good opportunity for those less experienced ringers to participate in competition ringing, so if your tower
